YCUA Mission Statement

The Ypsilanti Community Utilities Authority (YCUA) provides water and wastewater services to the Ypsilanti area. Water and/or wastewater services are provided to the City of Ypsilanti, Charter Township of Ypsilanti, Pittsfield Township, Augusta Township, Sumpter Township and Superior Township. YCUA contracts with the Western Townships Utilities Authority (WTUA) to provide wastewater treatment services for the Townships of Canton, Northville, and Plymouth.



What NOT to Put Down the Toilet, Drain or Garbage Disposal

In order to prevent blockages, please refrain from dumping the following items down your toilet, sink, drainpipe or garbage disposal:

- ◆ rags
- ◆ condoms
- ◆ bags/wrappings and cardboard
- ◆ motor oil, transmission fluids, anti-freeze or other toxic chemicals
- ◆ solvents, paints, turpentine, nail polish, polish remover
- ◆ flammable or explosive substances
- ◆ corrosive substances that are either acidic or caustic
- ◆ needles and sharps
- ◆ prescription and over-the-counter medications
- ◆ fats, oils or grease from cooking, cars or lawnmowers
- ◆ coffee grinds
- ◆ egg shells
- ◆ produce stickers
- ◆ chunks of garbage
- ◆ disposable diapers
- ◆ feminine hygiene products
- ◆ paper towels
- ◆ flushable cat litter

Why is this a problem?

Any solid matter that you put down the toilet or drainpipe has the potential to cause blockages in both the public sewer or your own private drain. This can lead to:

- ◆ Raw sewage overflowing in your home or your neighbor's home;
- ◆ An expensive and unpleasant cleanup;
- ◆ Raw sewage overflowing into yards, and streets;
- ◆ Potential contact with disease-causing organisms;
- ◆ An increase in operation and maintenance costs for local sewer departments, which can cause higher sewer bills for customers; and
- ◆ Increased pollution due to sewage spills caused by the blockages.

Private drainage systems (the part of the drainage network between your home and the public sewer) use narrow pipe-work and sometimes have bends in them where solid objects can lodge and cause blockages.

It is the responsibility of the homeowner to maintain private drainage systems if there is no approved cleanout at the front property line.
